Biography

George Paraskevas received his medical degree from the Medical School of National and Kapodistrian University of Athens (1989) and his PhD from the same School (2000). He received the License to practice Neurology in 1995. Since 2007 he served as a Lecturer, Assistant and Associate Professor of Neurology in the 1st Dept. of Neurology of the National and Kapodistrian University of Athens (Eginition Hospital). Since 2020 he is a Professor of Neurology and Neuropsychology in the 2nd Dept. of Neurology of the same University. During all the above period he has substantially contributed to the education of students and residents in Neurology. He has been invited to international conferences to give lectures. He is a member (and currently the representative) of the "Cognitive Disorders and Dementia branch" of the Greek Neurological Society where he is actively engaged in educational activities and guidelines or recommendations for neurologists on the field of dementia.
